Top tips on writing your intervention

You can structure your intervention any way you like, but you might find the following helpful as guidance for a short written submission:

A bit about yourself (1-3 sentences) — Who are you? Do you live in the community? What is your interest in this project — why do you care?

A few key messages about the project (2-6 sentences) — This is where you can share what aspect of the project resonate with you. Information about the project can be found in the NSDF Key Messages documents (additional attachment) and on the Virtual Visitor Centre. You don't necessarily need a lot of technical details, unless that is your area of expertise.

<u>Key Takeaways (1-2 sentences)</u> — Why should the regulator care what you think? Is there a reason the rest of society should care about this project? This could also be a summarizing statement of what you've already written.

Written
